WHAT IS THE ECUMENICAL INSTITUTE OF THEOLOGY?

The Ecumenical Institute of Theology (E.I.) was founded in 1968 as the evening division of St. Mary's Seminary & University to provide accredited graduate theological education in the greater Baltimore area. Students and faculty come from a wide range of religious backgrounds. Many students study part-time for personal enrichment or to prepare for leadership roles in their religious communities. Other students are preparing for ordained ministry or professional positions. The Ecumenical Institute promotes mutual respect and understanding for persons of all faiths. As the E.I. turns 40, we invite you to join us on the journey of faith seeking understanding and understanding making a difference.

WHAT KINDS OF COURSES AND STUDENTS DOES THE E.I. HAVE?

The E.I. offers courses in the major areas of theology: biblical studies, history, systematic theology, moral theology (theological ethics), religious education, practical theology, spirituality, and ecumenical and interfaith studies. Classes are offered in fall, spring, and summer terms. Course brochures with registration forms are mailed out 8-10 weeks before a term begins. Students may audit courses or take courses for credit without being in a degree or certificate program. Our Explorations in Theology program is designed for new students engaging theology and ethics for the first time. Students may choose to work toward a graduate certificate by earning 6-23 credits in a particular area. The certificate is available in six areas: biblical studies, parish nursing, religious education, spirituality, urban ministry, and youth ministry. Students may also pursue the M.A. in Theology or the M.A. in Church Ministries, each with several concentrations or tracks. Both degree programs require the completion of 50 credits, including a core curriculum, plus a culminating experience. We also offer a post-master's Certificate of Advanced Studies (C.A.S.) for those who have a graduate theological degree.

WHO MAY ENROLL?

Application to the E.I. to take classes for credit is open to any person with an undergraduate degree from an accredited institution, regardless of major, who has earned a minimum cumulative GPA of 2.75 (graduate GPA of 3.30 for the C.A.S.). (Students with a lower GPA may apply for probationary admission.) With the written permission of their department chair, their dean, and the dean of the E.I., juniors and seniors majoring in theology or religious studies at fully accredited colleges and universities may take certain courses for credit to transfer to their undergraduate institution. Interested students should contact the dean of the E.I. The E.I. admits audit students to most of its courses. Auditors in most of these courses do not need a bachelor's degree but must have at least 60 fully accredited undergraduate credits with a minimum GPA of 2.0. The E.I. reserves the right to restrict the number of auditors and to augment the requirements for audit admission.

All prospective students for the Fall 2008 term must complete the application process by August 15 (see details below). All students must fill out a registration form for each term in which they take classes.

Application to a degree program requires two letters of recommendation, as well as successful completion of an in-house academic skills assessment, unless the applicant has earned a previous graduate degree in the humanities (or in any field, with thesis), a professional degree in law or medicine, a 600 on the verbal portion of the GRE, or a Ph.D. Potential degree students should complete the

application requirements in the first semester of enrollment. Certificate applicants need a bachelor's degree and one professional letter of recommendation. C.A.S. applicants need a theological master's degree and one letter of recommendation.

INFORMATION FOR NEW STUDENTS

All prospective students for the Fall 2008 term must complete an application, submit a photograph, have an official transcript of their bachelor's degree sent from their undergraduate institution (master's transcript for C.A.S.), and schedule an interview by August 15. New audit students are requested, but not required, to have an interview to discuss their academic goals. **All new students must attend new student orientation** on Saturday, September 6, from 9:00-11:00 a.m. New students normally take BS600 and/or TH601, or one of the other Explorations in Theology courses, which do not have prerequisites. (Explorations in Theology is described later in this brochure.)

GENERAL INFORMATION ABOUT FALL TERM

The Fall 2008 term will begin on Tuesday, September 2 and end on Thursday, December 11. Most fall classes meet one afternoon or evening per week. There will be no classes on Monday, October 20 (Columbus Day observed) and Wednesday-Thursday, November 26-27 (Thanksgiving Holidays). All Fall 2008 courses (except BS600 and BS690) yield three graduate credits. In addition to the listed courses, independent study courses in various areas may be arranged. (Independent study tuition is \$423.00 per credit.) More complete course descriptions, including requirements and textbooks, will be available via email and at the Ecumenical Institute office during registration. Normally, at least five students must register in order for a course to run. (If a course is canceled, students who have registered for it will be notified by telephone or email.) Students should arrive early on the first day of classes to complete registration if necessary, receive their identification badge, obtain a library card from the circulation desk, and visit the bookstore to purchase textbooks.

REGISTRATION INFORMATION

Students may register by mail or in person during regular office hours. Continuing students should register early to insure that all elective courses can run and to facilitate book ordering. Students desiring to pay on the deferred payment plan will be mailed a contract. Special in-person registration times are as follows:

Late registrations will be accepted until the first meeting of a class, but there is a late registration fee of \$30.00 beginning Monday, July 21 (except for new students). The staff is available for academic counseling Monday-Friday, 9:00 a.m. - 4:00 p.m., or other times by appointment, in the E.I. office, 223B.

CHANGES IN REGISTRATION

Any changes in registration (e.g., credit to audit, audit to credit, withdrawal) must be made **in writing with a signature** (by mail or fax; no email). Changes are effective when received by the registrar's office. All students who do not officially withdraw **in writing with a signature** (by mail or fax; no email) from a course by the deadline for the term in which they are enrolled will receive a grade based on the work completed and/or not completed for the course.

BASIC INFORMATION/SPECIAL NOTICES

WHAT DOES IT COST AND HOW DO I PAY?

The tuition charge is \$846 *per three-credit course* (\$282 per credit). The audit tuition is \$564 *per three-credit course* with a discount of 50% for senior citizens (62 or older) and graduates of SMSU. The registration fee is \$55.00 *per term* for all students. There is also a student services fee of \$75.00 *per term*. Payment may be made with MasterCard or Visa. A deferred payment plan of payments spread throughout the term, beginning with registration, may be authorized upon consultation with the administration.

- 1. Continuing students who register by July 18, 2008 may do so by paying in full (check, money order, cash, or credit card), paying on an approved deferred payment (installment) plan, or paying their fees only (\$130.00). A late fee of \$30.00 applies beginning July 21. For those who pay fees only, tuition is due in full by September 2, 2008. Students cannot attend class until their tuition is paid or they have signed a deferred payment contract.**
- 2. Continuing students who register after July 18 must pay a late registration fee of \$30.00 and all tuition and fees in full (check, money order, cash, or credit card), or be approved for a deferred payment (installment) plan.**
- 3. New students should register early to insure their choice of classes, but they do not pay a late fee for late registration.**

A limited number of partial tuition scholarships is available for matriculated degree candidates. The E.I. also has a Partnership Scholarship Fund for students sponsored by their churches. Further information and scholarship applications can be obtained from the E.I. office. **Scholarship applications are due August 4, 2008.** (Matriculated students interested in student loans should contact Joyce Williams, 410/864-4273 or jwilliams@stmarys.edu, in St. Mary's Office of Student Aid. She has day and evening hours by appointment.) Continuing students must meet all previous financial obligations to St. Mary's before registering for the new term. In addition, students must be in good standing with the library before attending the first class of the term.

TUITION REDUCTION AND REFUND

Students who withdraw from a course must fulfill their financial obligations for the course. Tuition charges may be reduced for students who officially withdraw, according to the schedule printed below. (The date used to determine the reduction or refund is the date on which a written withdrawal notice is received by the registrar.)

ATTENTION PROSPECTIVE STUDENTS

CONSIDER THE EXPLORATIONS IN THEOLOGY PROGRAM

Explorations in Theology is a series of courses for people considering serious study of theology, religion, and ethics for the first time. It is designed to introduce beginning students to major dimensions of the theological tradition and to help them better understand some of the great religious and ethical issues of our time. Courses in the Explorations in Theology program have no prerequisites or corequisites, and most do not require a research paper (except BS600 and TH601, which are designed in part to teach research skills). Grading is based primarily on class participation, analytical papers, reaction papers, and/or exams.

The Curriculum

The courses offered in this program in Fall 2008 are:

- BS511 The Gospel of John
- BS600 Orientation to Biblical Studies
- ES/H511 The American Religious Experience
- SP515 Theology & Practice of Prayer
- TH601 Introduction to Theological Study, Research & Writing

Note: All 500-level courses are co-listed at the 700-level (e.g., SP515/715 Theology & Practice of Prayer) so that certificate and degree candidates may take them, too (at the 700 level), usually with a required research paper.

Starting with Explorations in Theology

Students who qualify for admission to the Ecumenical Institute and are interested in Explorations apply as graduate-credit-only students without declaring interest in a particular certificate or degree program. They may then take any courses that have no co- or prerequisites, as well as any other courses for which they fulfill the co- or prerequisites.

Students who later decide to matriculate into a certificate or degree program may count up to *two* 500-level courses (and any number of 600- or 700-level courses) that they have taken, as long as the courses fulfill core requirements or elective slots in the chosen certificate or degree program. Matriculated degree and certificate candidates may not enroll in 500-level courses but must register for those courses at the 700 level. Students in the Explorations in Theology program are assigned an advisor to help them think about their selection of courses and their decisions regarding further theological study.

THE CERTIFICATE OF ADVANCED STUDIES IN THEOLOGY (C.A.S.)

The **Certificate of Advanced Studies in Theology (C.A.S.)** is designed for individuals who possess a master's degree in theology (e.g., M.A. Theol.), ministry (e.g., M.A. in Church Ministries), divinity (e.g., M.Div.), or a related field and who desire to continue their theological education for personal and/or professional enrichment. The 30-credit (10-course) program can be taken on a full-time or part-time basis. A maximum of five years is allowed for completion. The program is composed in part of regular courses available to students studying for master's degrees and in part of specialized, advanced work specific to this program. Tuition is the same as for the master's program.

The Curriculum

In general, students construct their own curriculum (either *general* or *specialized*), in consultation with their advisor, as long as the curriculum falls within the program guidelines.

General Track

- Eight (8) 700-level courses (occasional 600-level courses may count with pre-approval) of the student's choice, with at least **two** courses in one department
- One (1) TH795 seminar, departmental seminar (xx794), or colloquium (TH799)
- One (1) TH790 directed reading course

Specialized Tracks

- Eight (8) 700-level courses (occasional 600-level courses may count with pre-approval), with at least **four** courses in one department (e.g., Biblical Studies or Moral Theology)
- One (1) TH795 seminar, departmental seminar (xx794), or colloquium (TH799)
- One (1) TH790 directed reading course in a subject related to the department of specialization

Admission to the Program

Admission to the C.A.S. is on a rolling basis; applicants may apply at any time. Criteria for admission are: (1) possession of an ATS-accredited and regionally accredited master's degree in theological studies (e.g., M.A., M.Div.), or its equivalent, with a minimum GPA of 3.30; and (2) evidence of potential for success in advanced theological study at the Ecumenical Institute.

Applicants must submit the following: (1) an application; (2) a sealed, official transcript of the accredited theological master's degree (unless the degree was earned at St. Mary's); (3) one academic letter of recommendation; and (4) a recent photograph. Applicants must also schedule an interview with the director of the C.A.S. program.
