**WHAT IS THE ECUMENICAL INSTITUTE OF THEOLOGY?**

The Ecumenical Institute of Theology (E.I.) was founded in 1968 as the evening division of St. Mary's Seminary & University to provide accredited graduate theological education in the greater Baltimore area. Students and faculty come from a wide range of religious backgrounds. Many students study part-time for personal enrichment or to prepare for leadership roles in their religious communities. Other students are preparing for ordained ministry or professional positions. The Ecumenical Institute promotes mutual respect and understanding for persons of all faiths. We invite you to join us on the journey of faith seeking understanding and understanding making a difference.

**WHAT KINDS OF COURSES DOES THE E.I. HAVE?**

The E.I. offers courses in the major areas of theology: biblical studies, history, systematic theology, moral theology (theological ethics), religious education, practical theology, spirituality, and ecumenical and interfaith studies. Classes are offered in fall, spring, and summer terms.

Our Explorations in Theology program is designed for individuals engaging theology and ethics for the first time. Students interested in a certificate or degree program have several options. They may choose to work toward a graduate certificate in one of six areas: biblical studies, faith community/parish nursing, religious education, spirituality, urban ministry, and youth and family ministry. Students may also pursue the M.A. in Theology or the M.A. in Church Ministries, each with several concentrations or tracks. We also offer a post-master's Certificate of Advanced Studies (C.A.S.) for those who have a graduate theological degree. **WHO MAY ENROLL?**

Application to the E.I. to take classes for credit is open to any person with an undergraduate degree from an accredited institution, regardless of major, who has earned a minimum cumulative GPA of 2.75 (graduate GPA of 3.30 for the C.A.S.). Students with a lower GPA may apply for probationary admission. With the written permission of their department chair, their dean, and the dean of the E.I., juniors and seniors majoring in theology or religious studies at fully accredited colleges and universities may take certain courses for credit to transfer to their undergraduate institution. Interested students should contact the dean of the E.I.

Audit students are admitted to most E.I. courses. Normally auditors do not need a bachelor's degree but must have at least 60 fully accredited undergraduate credits with a minimum GPA of 2.0. The E.I. reserves the right to restrict the number of auditors and to augment the requirements for audit admission.

**INFORMATION FOR NEW STUDENTS**

*Prospective students must complete an application, submit a photograph and signed criminal background check authorization form, have an official transcript of their bachelor's degree sent from their undergraduate institution (master's transcript for C.A.S.), and schedule an interview by December 15.*

New audit students are requested, but not required, to have an interview to discuss their academic goals. **All new students must attend new student orientation** on Saturday, January 7, from 9:00-11:00 a.m. New students normally take BS600 and/or TH601, or one of the other Explorations in Theology courses, which do not have prerequisites.

**Criminal Background Checks:** Consistent with our objective to safeguard individuals with whom students interact, a criminal background check is required of all students. All applicants for admission and returning students who have not had the criminal background check (instituted in fall 2009) must complete and submit the Disclosure and Authorization to Release Information form. Upon written request, additional information as to the nature and scope of the criminal background reports, as well as a summary of a student's rights under the Fair Credit Reporting Act, will be provided to any student.

**GENERAL INFORMATION ABOUT SPRING TERM**

The Spring 2012 term will begin on Saturday, January 7 and end on Thursday, May 3. Most spring classes meet one afternoon or evening per week. There will be no classes on Monday, January 16 (Martin Luther King Day), Monday-Saturday, February 20-25 (Winter Break), and Saturday-Saturday, March 31-April 14 (Easter Break). All Spring 2012 courses yield three graduate credits. In addition to the listed courses, independent study courses in various areas may be arranged. (Independent study tuition is \$472.50 per credit.) More detailed course descriptions, including requirements and textbooks, will be available via email and at the Ecumenical Institute office during registration. Normally, at least five students must register in order for a course to run. If a course is canceled, students who have registered for it will be notified by telephone or email.

Students should arrive early on the first day of classes to complete registration and/or obtain a library card, if necessary, and to receive their identification badge and any printed materials for the term.

**REGISTRATION INFORMATION**

Students may register by mail or in person during regular office hours. Continuing students should register early to ensure that all elective courses can run. Students desiring to pay on the deferred payment plan will be mailed a contract. Special in-person registration times are as follows:

Late registrations will be accepted until the first meeting of a class, but there is a late registration fee of \$30.00 beginning Monday, November 21 (except for new students). The staff is available for academic counseling Monday-Friday, 9:00 a.m.-4:00 p.m., or other times by appointment, in the E.I. office, 223B.

**CHANGES IN REGISTRATION**

**Any** changes in registration (e.g., credit to audit, audit to credit, withdrawal) must be made **in writing with a signature** (by mail or fax; no email). Changes are effective when received by the registrar. All students who do not officially withdraw **in writing with a signature** (by mail or fax; no email) from a course by the deadline for the term in which they are enrolled will receive a grade based on the work completed and/or not completed for the course.

## BASIC INFORMATION/SPRING EVENTS

### WHAT DOES IT COST AND HOW DO I PAY?

The tuition charge is \$945 *per course*. The audit tuition charge is \$630 *per course*, with a 50% discount for senior citizens (62 or older) and alumni. **All students pay fees of \$160 per term, which are non-refundable.** Payment is accepted by check, money order, MasterCard, Visa, Discover, or cash. A deferred payment plan of three payments in the fall and spring or two in the summer, beginning with fees paid at registration, may be authorized upon consultation with the administration. All previous financial obligations to St. Mary's *must* be met before registering for the new term.

Continuing students who register by November 18, 2011 may do so by paying fees and tuition in full, paying fees only, or paying fees and electing a deferred payment contract. For those who pay fees only, tuition is due in full by the first day of classes. For those who request a deferred payment plan, the first installment is due by the first day of classes. Students *may not* attend class until tuition is paid in accordance with the chosen payment option. Students *must* also be in good standing with the library before attending the first class of the term. Continuing students who register after November 18 will be charged a \$30 late-registration fee. New students are encouraged to register early to ensure their choice of classes, but are exempt from the late-registration fee.

### E.I. SCHOLARSHIPS & FEDERAL AND STATE FINANCIAL AID

A limited number of partial tuition scholarships are available from the E.I. The eligibility and submission requirements for each scholarship are outlined on the E.I. Scholarship Application and Information Sheet, on the website, and in the Academic Catalog. Scholarship applications can be obtained from the E.I. Billing Officer and Financial Aid Coordinator, Victoria Gaunt ([vgaut@stmarys.edu](mailto:vgaut@stmarys.edu) or 410/864-4234), on our website ([http://www.stmarys.edu/ei/ei\\_forms.htm](http://www.stmarys.edu/ei/ei_forms.htm)), or in the main E.I. office. *Completed applications are due no later than December 1.* Students interested in Federal Student Aid or Maryland State Scholarships should also contact the E.I. Billing Officer and Financial Aid Coordinator. To receive aid for the spring term, the FAFSA results from the U.S. Department of Education must be received by December 1.

### TUITION REDUCTION AND REFUND

Students who withdraw from a course must fulfill their financial obligations for the course. The schedule printed below lists the deadlines by which *an official written and signed withdrawal notice must* be received by the Registrar in order for the student to be eligible for the corresponding percent of reduction in tuition.

After 0 to 1 class meeting	100% reduction
Before January 30	75% reduction
Before February 13	50% reduction
Before February 27	25% reduction
After February 27	0% reduction

Note: For classes meeting five or fewer days during a term (such as a Saturday course), the schedule of tuition reduction is 75% after the first class, 50% after the second class, and none thereafter. Fees are *not* refunded when a student withdraws at any time or for any reason.

## **The Cities of Paul and John Study Trip**

**BS/H669**

**April 9-20, 2012**

*with Dr. Michael J. Gorman*

**Deposit deadline: November 1, 2011**

This study trip to Athens, Corinth, Ephesus, Laodicea, Pergamum, Cappadocia, Istanbul/Constantinople, and more is for anyone who wants to see the letters of Paul, the book of Revelation, and the Acts of the Apostles with fresh eyes. Trip cost: \$4,399 (\$800 deposit due November 1—late registrations taken as space is available). Tuition for three graduate or undergraduate credits: \$350 (\$300 audit). This course may be used as a general, biblical studies (BS), or history (H) elective; to fulfill a requirement for a course on Paul; or to fulfill a requirement for a second history (H) course.

## ATTENTION PROSPECTIVE STUDENTS

### CONSIDER THE EXPLORATIONS IN THEOLOGY PROGRAM

**Explorations in Theology** is a series of courses for people considering serious study of theology, religion, and ethics for the first time. It is designed to introduce beginning students to major dimensions of the theological tradition and to help them better understand some of the great religious and ethical issues of our time. Courses in the Explorations in Theology program have no prerequisites or corequisites, and most do not require a research paper (except BS600 and TH601, which are designed, in part, to teach research skills). Grading is based primarily on class participation, analytical papers, reaction papers, and/or exams.

#### **The Curriculum**

The courses offered in this program in Spring 2012 are:

#### Spring Explorations in Theology Courses

*The following courses have no prerequisites:*

- BS600      Orientation to Biblical Studies
- BS511      The Gospel of John
- BS/H669    Cities of Paul & John Study Trip
- H/MT549    Religious Interpretations of the American Civil War
- TH601      Introduction to Theological Study, Research & Writing

Note: All 500-level courses (e.g., BS511 The Gospel of John) are co-listed at the 700-level (e.g., BS711) so that certificate and degree candidates may take them, too (at the 700 level), usually with a required research paper.

#### **Starting with Explorations in Theology**

Students who qualify for admission to the Ecumenical Institute and are interested in Explorations apply as graduate-credit-only students without declaring interest in a particular certificate or degree program. They may then take any courses that have no co- or prerequisites, as well as any other courses for which they fulfill the co- or prerequisites.

Students who later decide to matriculate into a certificate or degree program may count up to *two* 500-level courses (and any number of 600- or 700-level courses) that they have taken, as long as the courses fulfill core requirements or elective slots in the chosen certificate or degree program. Matriculated degree and certificate candidates may not enroll in 500-level courses but must register for those courses at the 700 level. Students in the Explorations in Theology program are assigned an advisor to help them think about their selection of courses and their decisions regarding further theological study.

## ATTENTION ALUMS & CLERGY

### THE CERTIFICATE OF ADVANCED STUDIES IN THEOLOGY (C.A.S.)

The **Certificate of Advanced Studies in Theology** (C.A.S.) is designed for individuals who possess a master's degree in theology (e.g., M.A. Theol.), ministry (e.g., M.A. in Church Ministries), divinity (e.g., M.Div.), or a related field and who desire to continue their theological education for personal and/or professional enrichment. The 30-credit (10-course) program can be taken on a full-time or part-time basis. A maximum of five years is allowed for completion. The program is composed in part of regular courses available to students studying for master's degrees and in part of specialized, advanced work specific to this program. Tuition is the same as for the master's program.

#### **The Curriculum**

In general, students construct their own curriculum, in consultation with their advisor, following one of three tracks:

#### **General Track**

- Eight 700-level courses (occasional 600-level courses may count with pre-approval) of the student's choice, with at least **two** courses in one department
- One TH795 seminar, departmental seminar (xx794), or colloquium (TH799)
- One TH790 directed reading course

#### **Specialized Tracks**

- Eight 700-level courses (occasional 600-level courses may count with pre-approval), with at least **four** courses in one department (e.g., Biblical Studies or Moral Theology)
- One TH795 seminar, departmental seminar (xx794), or colloquium (TH799)
- One TH790 directed reading course in a subject related to the department of specialization

#### **Research Track**

- Six 700-level courses (occasional 600-level courses may count with pre-approval) with at least **two** courses in one department
- One TH795 seminar, departmental seminar (xx794), or colloquium (TH799)
- One TH790 directed reading course
- Two guided research projects, TH791 and TH792, each focused on the preparation of a substantive paper or other appropriate final project. The subjects of the two research projects may be related, though they do not need to be.

#### **Admission to the Program**

Admission to the C.A.S. is on a rolling basis; applicants may apply at any time. Criteria for admission are: (1) possession of an ATS-accredited and regionally accredited master's degree in theological studies (e.g., M.A., M.Div.), or its equivalent, with a minimum GPA of 3.30; and (2) evidence of potential for success in advanced theological study at the Ecumenical Institute. Applicants to the research track must have demonstrated advanced research skills.
