Course Description (include overall goal)

This course will serve as an introduction to theological concepts found in the Torah, Prophets, and Writings, as well as their historical and social contexts, with consideration of critical methodology and major themes. The goal of the course is to help students become familiar with contents of the Hebrew Bible, to read texts critically, and to engage thoughtfully with theological themes in the Hebrew Bible and their ethical implications for contemporary Christian practice.

Course Requirements

- Students should expect to read at most 1000 pages of required reading from the required texts below. In addition to the Collins text, the required readings will also include readings from the Bible and supplementary articles that will be supplied by the professor.
- Students should expect to write at most 25 double-spaced pages. Graded writing assignments will include the following:
 - 1. Final Exegesis paper 12-15 pages (25%)
 - 2. 3 Short exegetical exercises –3 pages each (30%)
- In addition to reading and writing, students should expect to produce or participate in these additional graded learning activities:

1.	4 in-class assessments	(15%)
2.	Midterm	(20%)
3.	Attendance and Participation	(10%)
