ST601 Foundations of Systematic Theology

Goal

The goal of *Foundations of Systematic Theology* is to enable students to understand and think critically about the Christian doctrines like revelation, God, grace, sin, and salvation by paying attention to theological method and the history of the Christian theological tradition.

Reading Requirements

Students should expect to read 906 pages from the required texts listed below.

Writing Requirements

Students should expect to write at most twenty double-spaced pages. This will consist of **three** short papers six-seven pages in length. Each paper is worth 20% of the course grade

Other

In addition to reading, writing, and class participation, students should expect to produce or participate in these additional graded activities:

- a. An in-class final exam consisting of three essay questions and eight to ten objective questions. The exam represents 30% of the course grade.
- b. Depending on the class size, students will facilitate one to three twenty minute class discussions. 5% of grade.
- c. A group online discussion forum. 5% of grade.
