TH601 Introduction to Theological Study as Friendship

Dr. Ed Richardson

Course Description:

This course introduces ecumenical study of theology under the theme of friendship. It surveys the major disciplines of theological understanding: biblical, historical, systematic, moral, spiritual and practical. It introduces the tools of theological research and writing. And it develops competence in the techniques and strategies for graduate level critical reading, study and writing (including research papers).

Course Requirements:

- Students should expect to read *at most* <u>750</u> pages of required reading.
- Students should expect to write *at most* <u>20-24</u> double-spaced pages. These will be composed of the following:
 - 1. One journal article critiques/response, submitted twice, 4-6 pages (20% of grade)
 - 2. Five bi-weekly reflections, 2 pages each (20% of grade)
 - 3. Final research paper, 6-8 pages (40% of grade)
- In addition to reading, writing and class participation, students should expect to produce or participate in these additional graded learning activities:
 - 1. Weekly online discussions, based on videos and class discussion.
 - 2. Complete a library assignment that contributes to the research paper (10%)
 - 3. Graded in-class participation which includes in-class writing exercises. (10%)
