TH601 Introduction to Theological Study

Course Description:

An introduction to the study of theology, including what theology is and how theology is done. Students will develop the ability to read, think, and write critically and faithfully, through a focus on the ecumenical spectrum of Christian believing.

Course Requirements:

This course is being redesigned for Fall 2017. A complete set of requirements will be included in the course syllabus.

- **Reading:** Students should expect to read at most 900 pages of required reading and should come prepared to discuss readings in class.
- **Writing:** There are numerous short writing assignments (including narrative, analysis, and argument). Total writing for the semester will be no more than 25 pages.
- Other: Class participation is an essential aspect of our shared learning. Students will read, write, analyze, and discuss in class.
