### **BS622** The Literature and Theology of the New Testament

#### Dr. Drew Strait

Course Description: An exploration of the New Testament in its historical and social settings, focusing on the unique purpose and theology of each writing, focusing especially on questions of Christology (= Jesus' identity and mission) and discipleship/spirituality (= the response to Jesus; lived experience). We will use critical tools and skills to read the New Testament theologically—as Scripture. This course builds on BS600 and TH601; is best taken with some knowledge of the Christian Old Testament/Hebrew Bible, such as that gained in BS621; is a foundation for future work in New Testament studies; and should be, as a study of part of the "soul" of all Christian theology (i.e., Scripture), an aid to more faithful Christian thinking and living.

### **Course Requirements:**

- Students should expect to read at most ~800 pages from the required texts listed below.
- Students should expect to write *at most* 25 double-spaced pages. These will be comprised of the following:
  - 1. Exegetical worksheets: 20% of grade (Note: worksheets will be collected and assigned a simple evaluation of acceptable  $[\sqrt{}]$ , outstanding  $[\sqrt{+}]$ , or unacceptable  $[\sqrt{}]$ .) Worksheet preparation should take about 1.5 hours—they are one page.
  - 2. A 1,000-word paper comparing and contrasting a text that appears in all three Synoptic Gospels: 20% of grade (You may choose from several possible passages that are listed in this syllabus).
  - 3. A 2,500-word research exegesis paper on one NT text or a research thematic paper on one document or author: 35% of grade.
  - 4. A 1,000-word paper on the significance of one NT document for Christian theology: 25% of grade.
- In addition to the reading, writing and class participation, students should expect to participate in weekly in-class small and large-group discussions.
