



CONNECT: Faith, Health & Medicine Graduate Certificate

A 12-credit program of graduate study integrating faith traditions and medical practices into a holistic understanding of healthy persons, congregations, communities, and institutions.

CONNECT is for

- doctors, nurses, and other medical professionals
- chaplains, pastors, and other ministers (counts as half the coursework for a DMin, or 10 CEUs)
- theological students (earn one fourth of the MA in Church Ministries, or a graduate certificate)
- *everyone* concerned with the challenges of integrating faith and health

CONNECT is organized as

- five sequential modules plus a practicum that together build understanding and competency:

Text and Tradition: Health, Healing, and Human Flourishing in the Biblical Narrative (3 credits)

Fridays 6–9 pm, Saturdays 8:30–4:30: Jan. 18-19, Feb. 15-16, March 15-16

Science Looks at Faith: The “Faith & Health” Movement (1 credit)

Fridays 6–9 pm, Saturdays 8:30–4:30: April 26-27

I and Thou – The Imperative of Relationships (1 credit)

Fridays 6–9 pm, Saturdays 8:30–4:30: May 31-June 1

Practicum – Faith & Health in Action (2 credits, required only for Certificate students)

Students may do the practicum concurrently or in the summer.

Medicine and Morality: The Shape of Curing and Caring in The Christian Tradition (3 credits)

What People Believe Matters – World Religions’ Views on Health and Illness (2 credits)

Faculty Leaders

Pat Fosarelli, MD, DMin, is Associate Dean of St. Mary's Ecumenical Institute, where she teaches in the areas of spirituality, practical theology, and faith and health. Since 1983, she has also served on both the full-time and part-time faculty at Johns Hopkins University School of Medicine (Department of Pediatrics). Dr. Fosarelli is the author of 12 books, including *The Family Ministry Desk Reference*; *Prayers and Rituals at a Time of Illness and Dying: The Practices of Five World Religions*, and *Whatever You Do for the Least of These: Ministering to Ill and Dying Children and Their Families*.

Joel Shuman, PhD, PT, is Professor of Theology at King's College, where he was a long-serving chair of the Department of Theology. After practicing physical therapy for several years, he pursued theology, studying New Testament with Richard Hays and Christian Ethics with Stanley Hauerwas. A noted medical ethicist, he has written *The Body of Compassion: Ethics, Medicine and the Church*, *Heal Thyself: Spirituality, Medicine and the Distortion of Christianity* (with Keith Meador, M.D.), *Reclaiming the Body: Christians and the Faithful Use of Modern Medicine* (with Brian Volck, M.D.), and *To Live is to Worship: Bioethics and the Body of Christ* (2007). He co-edited (with L. Roger Owens) and contributed to the volume of essays, *Wendell Berry and Religion: Heaven's Earthly Home*.

Brian Volck, MD, MFA, is a pediatrician with extensive intercultural experience in Central America and on the Navajo Nation. A theologian, essayist and poet, he is the author of *Attending Others: A Doctor's Education in Bodies and Words*, *Flesh Becomes Word: Poems*, and coauthor of *Reclaiming the Body: Christians and the Faithful Use of Modern Medicine*. While serving as Assistant Professor at the Cincinnati Children's Hospital Medical Center, he was a founding instructor in the Global Child Health Boot Camp, the Initiative on Poverty, Justice and Health, and an elective on literature and medicine. In 2014 he was Faculty Teacher of the Year. He is a long serving board member of the Ekklesia Project, and a member of the editorial board of the *Journal of Moral Theology*.

John Hayes, PhD, ABPP, MAT, is a psychologist and psychoanalyst and a priest of the Episcopal Diocese of Maryland. He is on the clinical staff of The Retreat at Sheppard Pratt Hospital and in private practice in Baltimore, and serves in the faculty of Psychiatry University of Maryland School of Medicine, Washington-Baltimore Psychoanalytic Institute, and the Brookhaven Institute for Psychoanalysis and Christian Theology. As a priest he pastors St. Luke's Church and offers spiritual direction and retreats, and teaches pastoral care and spirituality at St. Mary's Ecumenical Institute.
