**BS862 Reading Scripture**

(equivalent to Ashland Theological Seminary DM 911 Formational Hermeneutics)

**Dr. Michael J. Gorman**

**Course Description:**

An exploration, for D.Min. candidates, of approaches to reading Scripture for Christian faith, formation, ministries, and mission. Special emphasis will be given to (1) selected parts of the canon (Psalms, the Prophets, John, Acts, 1 Thessalonians, Philippians); (2) various approaches to reading the Bible as Scripture, including the main Christian traditions and several different cultures; (3) recent developments in theological and missional hermeneutics; and (4) the connection between Scripture and your D.Min. project. There will be required time both near the beginning of this course and at the end for reflection on course material and ministry (times for reflection TBA).

**Prerequisites:** BS600 and TH601, or permission of the instructor

**Course Requirements:**

**Students will be required to read about 1,500 pages and write no more than 35 pages.**

1. Regular use of the daily prayers from *Common Prayer: A Liturgy for Ordinary Radicals*.
2. Reading and study of all assigned texts, which may include a handful of articles.
3. Consistent and intelligent class contributions. (20%)
4. Three five-page papers (approx. 1,750 words each) (15% each = 45%)
5. A final paper of 15-20 pages (approx. 5,000-7,000 words) (35%).
