Course Name & Number: PT604 Biblical Storytelling (1.5 credits)

Instructor: Dr. Tracy Radosevic

Course Description:

An exploration of the history behind (and current need for) understanding, interpreting and ultimately communicating biblical passages – in virtually every area of ministry – through a discipline of internalizing, embodying, and storytelling.

Course Requirements:

- **Reading:** Students should expect to read at most 450 pages of required reading and should come prepared to discuss readings in class.
- **Writing:** Required writing assignments (include type & length of papers; percentage toward final grade that each paper contributes):
 - 5-page performance criticism exegesis on the Hebrew scripture told in class.
 (25%)
 - 5-page theological reflection paper on the ways traditional storytelling makes sense for ministry today, listing ways it could be intentionally incorporated into specific ministry settings. (*It is expected that all required readings be referenced.*) (25%)

• Other:

- o Internalize a biblical story from the Hebrew scriptures and tell it in class. (30%)
- O Class attendance, participation and contribution expected for all 4 sessions. (20%)
