Course Description

This course introduces Christian systematic theology, whose subject matter includes God and all things in relation to God. Topics will include core doctrines of the Christian tradition as well as various ways to organize and understand the relationships between those doctrines.

Course Requirements:

- **Reading:** Students should expect to read at most 600 pages of required reading and should come prepared to discuss readings in class.
- Writing: Required writing assignments:
 - A weekly 2-page summary of course readings (10% of final grade; graded for completion)
 - A 5-page paper analyzing a single topic in one week's readings (20% of final grade)
 - A 5-page paper analyzing the relationship of two topics (20% of final grade)
 - o A 6-8-page paper analyzing a work of theology chosen by each student (30% of final grade)
- Other: Other activities (including class participation) contributing to final grade:
 - Class participation (5% of final grade)
 - o Take-home exam (15% of final grade)
